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# Durham City

Durham is a small city, famous for its Norman Cathedral, Castle and medieval cobbled streets. Small hidden tea-rooms, are connected by a maze of alleyways to narrow, winding, streets, bustling with Saturday shoppers, whilst the sounds of buskers creep around the next corner.

As you walk along the street this is replaced by calm; blue-doored, slightly crooked, houses, separated by old college chapels and weathered sandstone walls. Old arched bridges, and modern concrete affairs, span the river, which plays a big part within the city.

Tranquil wooded areas, rushing weirs and the gentle splash of oars are all in the heart of the city. The river partitions the Old City, or 'Bailey' on a peninsular created by a large loop, but also provides Durham with more than its fair share of hills...

To the South of the Bailey, in an uphill direction, the larger hill colleges open out into large grassy areas and panoramic views of the cathedral, castle and the rolling County Durham landscape...

# Stewards

Stewards will be wearing bright yellow t-shirts. You can approach them for any information, including directions. Stewards can be found at all IVFDF events and will be at the festival office in Alington House 24 hours a day.

# Sleeping Venues

Indoor Camping this year is at three venues, all of which have toilets but no showers. You will be designated a sleeping venue when you pick up your tickets from the festival office. Please only sleep in the venue you have been allocated. Be aware;

There is no opportunity to use the power sockets in the sleeping venues due to fire regulations

Keep gangways clear of all bags to allow others access late at night.

All bags must be removed from the sleeping venue to the recommended rooms at the times stated below.

# **Alington House Hall**

This is in the same building as the late night dancing venue, so expect some noise.

Bags have to be moved by 9am on Saturday and 9.30am on Sunday. The allocated room will be accessible during the day.

# Elvet Methodist Church Hall

This is the designated room for mobility impaired people. No alcohol is allowed in the building.


Bags have to be moved by 9am on Saturday and Sunday The allocated room will be accessible during the day.

There are also coffee shops, take-outs and a small corner store between the DSU and Elvet Methodist Church along New Elvet.



Durham has a fine selection of tea-rooms and small taverns, but they are sometimes hidden down small alleyways. Ask a steward if you can't find any.

There is a Tesco on Market Square and a Sainsbury's near Vane Tempest Hall.

We can recommend the Court Inn for cheap, hearty festival food. Available from 11:00am for lunch and dinner.

Water will be available at all evening venues, but please bring a water bottle.



A truly inventive and innovative singer and fiddle player, she is also the winner of 7 BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards. Eliza grew up immersed in a world of traditional music. She divides her time between touring and recording with her legendary parents, Martin Carthy and Norma Waterson and numerous pioneering projects.

Joining Eliza is Aidan Curran, a Canadian born singer and guitar player. Aidan has a background in Bluegrass and Blues and is a founder member of the Park Bench Social Club. He has been a member of a number of bands all with terrific live reputations and it is this experience that makes him such a confident and exciting player, much in demand for his instrumental virtuosity and amazing voice.

# The Young Uns

The Young 'Uns are a Hartlepool based folk and maritime trio. Their singing is powerful and full of life, able to impress and move whoever comes in to contact with them. As a testament to this, in the relatively short time that the band has been together, they have made significant waves in the folk world; reading their list of tour dates can turn in to something of a marathon session! They founded the now renowned Pot House Folk Club which regularly attracts many people from all over the region as word gets out about this incredible trio.





# Fidola

Fidola are a duo from England and Sweden who met whilst studying traditional music at Bollnas Folkhogskola in Sweden. They are interested in combining the music of different cultures in their repertoire whilst appreciating their differences. Having only formed in September 2007, Fidola have achieved a large amount in their time together including appearances at Viljandi Folk Festival in Estonia, concerts & arts festivals in Halden, Norway, Folkmusikens Hus Rattvik, Sweden, and at The Sage Gateshead in Tyne and Wear.




